

It gives me great joy that the parishioners of St Louis Church are planning to bring out a souvenir in view of raising funds for the school project, which will be released on 19th April 2014, during the Easter Vigil mass.

St. Louis Church started as a small chapel, a sub-centre of one of the oldest churches in the Archdiocese of Mumbai - Our Lady of Immaculate Conception Church, Borivli West. A nursery level school was started in 1983. The centre was looked after by the Carmelite Fathers from 1984 to 1988. It was in 1994 this small prayer centre got a prayer hall and various associations were started in the centre.

This became a sub-centre of Immaculate Conception Church, Borivli until 2003 when the Holy Cross Fathers, who already had their house in the neighbourhood, took over responsibility for the pastoral care of the people. The project for building a Church and a school was soon initiated. The primary school was started in the year 2004. Through various fund raising activities and donations, the parish team was able to raise funds for the project. On April 6, 2008 the first phase of the project was completed. I was privileged to bless it which included, the consecration of a beautiful Church dedicated to our patron St. Louis.

I know that many of our dedicated priests and lay faithful have contributed their best to complete the second phase of the school project. May you through the apostolate of education continue to build God's Kingdom of love, peace and harmony.





### SAINT ANDRE BESSETTE, CSC

### POWERFUL INTERCESSOR FOR THE SICK

"I'm only Saint Joseph's little dog." That was the way Brother André used to call himself when the sick came to him seeking to be healed. His whole life proved that he was more than a "little dog," for he was canonized in Rome by Pope Benedict XVI on October 17, 2010.

Alfred Bessette was born on August 9, 1845, in a small town near Montreal, Canada. He was so frail at birth that the parish priest baptized him conditionally the following day, completing an emergency ritual performed soon after Alfred was born. His father, Isaac Bessette, was a woodcutter who lost his life in an accident, crushed by a falling tree. Alfred was nine at the time. Then his mother found herself widowed at the age of forty with ten children in her care, but she died of tuberculosis within three years. Later, Brother André would say: "I rarely prayed for my mother, but I often prayed to her," for he said, "she was always smilling, such a lovely smile!"

Since he did not have a trade, Alfred wandered from job to job for 13 years, with few belongings and little education. He was barely able to write his name or to read his prayer book. When he was 20 years old, Alfred migrated to the United States to earn a living. He worked four years in the textile mills. Though he was physically weak, he worked doggedly. "Despite my weak conditions," he said, "I did not let anyone get ahead of me as far as work was concerned." He returned to his native country in 1867.

His parish priest, Fr André Provençal, was much impressed by the devotion and generosity of the young man. Observing how Alfred was often seen praying in the church, the priest advised him to join the Congregation of Holy Cross in Montreal, which had sent its first missionaries to India in the year 1847. In a letter of recommendation, Fr. Peovençal wrote to the superior: "I'm sending you a saint." The Brothers found that difficult to believe. Although initially the superiors thought of rejecting him because of frail health, archbishop Ignace Bourget of Montreal intervened on his behalf and, in 1872, Alfred entered the novitiate and took the name of André, in honor of Fr Provençal, his parish priest.

Brother André was given the task of doorkeeper at Notre Dame College in Montreal. He fulfilled this function for some 40 years while at the same time doing innumerable odd jobs for the community. He used to joke: "At the end of my novitiate, my superiors showed me the door, and I stayed there for 40 years without leaving." His great confidence in Saint Joseph inspired him to recommend the saint's devotion to the afflicted who came to seek his help. Although he had a deep devotion to Saint Joseph, his primary love was the Passion of Christ, on which he often meditated. He spent much time in prayer, especially during the night, but never neglected his assigned responsibilities. All his activities for which he became famous were done in his off-duty time as doorkeeper. For 25 years, in his small office or in the tramway station across the street from the college, Brother André spent six to eight hours a day receiving the sick who sought healing from him.

On his many visits to the sick in their homes, he would recommend them in prayer to Saint Joseph and anoint them with oil from the lamp of the college chapel which always burned before Saint Joseph's statue. Many people claimed that they had been cured through the prayers of the good Brother and Saint Joseph. Brother André steadfastly refused to take any credit for these cures. On his window sill, facing Mount Royal was a small statue of Saint Joseph to whom he was especially devoted. "Some day," he said, "Saint Joseph will be honored on Mount Royal."

So, Brother André's reputation grew and soon he was known as the miracle worker of Mount Royal. He had to take the criticism of numerous adversaries, some of them being his own confreres. Doctors called him a quack. However, he had the strong support of his superiors and the diocesan Church. Thousands of cures without apparent medical explanation made him the object of popular acclaim.

In 1924, construction of a basilica, named Saint Joseph's Oratory, began on the side of the mountain. By 1931, the walls were completed, but money ran out. The aging Brother had only a few words of advice: "This is not my work; it is the work of Saint Joseph. Put his statue in the middle of the building. If he wants a roof over his head, he'll get

it." So, the construction of the magnificent Oratory – the largest church in the world dedicated to Saint Joseh – resumed smoothly. It took fifty years to build.

Brother André died in 1937, at the age of 91. He did not live to see the completion of his cherished dream. A million people filed past his coffin. Today, his body lies in a tomb built below the Oratory's main chapel. Numerous miracles have been credited to his intercession with Saint Joseph. At the Oratory, there is a wall with hundreds of canes propped against it, each having been left by a cripple who walked out after being healed.

Miracles can still take place today thanks to the saint's intercession.

### FR. PATRICK PEYTON, CSC - THE ROSARY PRIEST

Patrick Peyton was known all over the world as "The Rosary Priest." He had experienced Mary's powerful intervention in his own life and he wanted to tell the families of the world what Mary would do for them if they would open their hearts and their homes to her by praying together the family Rosary. He spoke softly in his native Irish tongue. He delivered his message with such humility, simplicity and earnestness that those who heard him were moved profoundly. Families committed themselves to pray the Rosary in their homes every day and remained faithful to those commitments for the rest of their lives. Nor did they forget him. They cherished the times when they were in his presence and heard him speak as precious moments of divine grace.

Patrick Peyton was born January 9, 1909. He was the sixth of nine children born to John and Mary (Gillard) Peyton, who gathered the whole family together every night to pray the Rosary by the light of the turf fire. The family made a meager living on their small farm in Carracastle, County Mayo, Ireland. In 1928, he and his older brother Tom went to the United States to find work. After meeting a priest who invited them to join the Congregation of Holy cross, they went to Notre dame and began their studies for the priesthood.

While still a student of theology, Patrick was stricken with tuberculosis. For almost a full year he languished in his hospital bed while his situation became increasingly grave. Father Hagerty, an old priest advisor, encouraged him to put his trust in the power of Mary's intercession and the Holy Cross community began a novena of Masses for his recovery. During that week he announced that he was better. The astonished doctors who examined him confirmed his cure and allowed him to return to his studies. He was ordained with his classmates on June 15, 1941.

In gratitude to Our Lady he was determined to spend his life promoting devotion to her so everyone would come to know the blessings she is eager to bestow on those who turn to her with confidence and love. Father Peyton was faithful to that commitment to the end of his life.

In 1942, with the approval of his superiors, he officially founded the family Rosary. His zeal was prodigious. He promoted family prayer, especially the Family Rosary, in parish missions, on radio and later on television. He founded Family Theatre of the Air, the longest running radio program in history, and for twenty-two years the great stars of Hollywood donated their talents to help him. In 1948, he began his famous Rosary Crusades, which took him all over the world and drew crowds estimated at two million in cities like Manila and Rio de Janeiro. Strengthened by prayer and his total commitment to Our Lady, he was able to overcome his natural shyness and in the most simple, artless, unaffected way he convinced millions of people all over the world to commit themselves to pray the Rosary every day with their families. No one ever said that he was a great orator, but all who heard him preach could sense that he was a holy man. He radiated the love of God and inspired everyone with his simple, tender, single-minded devotion to Our Lady.

He offered Mass and prayed his breviary daily with great devotion. He spent long hours in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament and prayed the Rosary whenever he could free his mind from the burdens of his work. In fact, the more troublesome his problems, the more earnestly he prayed. He had committed himself to work wholeheartedly for Our Lady, not for himself, and he knew she would come to his aid. His confidence in her was unbounded and she did not disappoint him. No matter how complex the problems of organizing huge Rosary Rallies, financing the production of movies and radio shows, traveling to distant cities and countries, or corresponding with the hundreds of people who wrote to ask for his prayers or to offer their contributions, he never lost his peace of mind or gentle manner. He never let the burdens he had to carry extinguish the love in his heart for the people he was trying to help. In fact, he manifested not only love, but also joy, peace, patience and all the other fruits of the Spirit (Cf Gal. 5: 22). He was truly a man of God. He spoke of himself as "Our Lady's donkey."

He died on June 3, 1992. At the urging of the Congregation of Holy Cross, the bishop of Fall River initiated Father Peyton's Cause of Canonization. Father Peyton is now called "Servant of God." Although Father Peyton died in 1992, his work continues as Holy Cross Family Ministries carries on his mission in 17 countries around the world.

By praying for favors through the intercession of Servant of God Patrick Peyton, CSC, many have found that their own devotion to our Lady has been rekindled. They have rediscovered the power of the Rosary to bring them inner peace and quiet confidence in Our Lady's motherly protection. They have realized the truth contained in the slogan that Father Peyton popularized: "The family that prays together stays together."

### EDUCATION-MOULDING GOOD HUMAN BEINGS

A heart of education is the education of heart.

The word education comes from the Latin word "educare", which means to bring out the best in the students and to inculcate in them the values to live for and to die for; values which guide our behaviour and put meaning into our existence. "Swami Vivekananda has said "Education is the manifestation of the divine perfection already existing in man."

Mankind is poised to enter a brave new age-an age where an effective level of international competitiveness is proving to be of essence. Also, our Hon'ble H.E. Ex-President Shri A.P.Abdul Kalam has given us a dream and aim to transform our country to a "Developed Country" from a "Developing Country". Here, academic institutes have a great role to play in enabling young people to have grand vision and to equip them with overall ability and precise skills to change the vision into a reality.

Students were different those days. They were docile, respectful, attentive, obedient and well disciplined. Classes were smaller, divisions were fewer, teacher pupil relationship was warmer, closer, life was less stressful and relaxed.

But in our modern age students are more knowledgeable, vibrant, alert and alive but are more restless. This is because of the media i.e. Facebook, e-learning, mobile, WhatsApp, e-mail etc. To top it all they are under tremendous pressure of cut throat competition of unrealistic expectation from parents, society, teachers, school, peer group etc. They are vulnerable to all these pressures. Here the parent as first teachers and teachers as second parents have to be more aware of these forces which are shaping the lives and the future of our students by being more loving, caring, understanding and sensitive to their needs. Therefore our teaching system should be holistic, dynamic, meaningful, useful, beneficial and above all relevant to their day to day life.

Just as the potter knows that it is next to impossible to reshape the pot after it is baked, similarly the young ones have to be moulded at this young age as it will be more difficult to reshape them at a later point in their lives. Children are like wet cement. Whatever falls on them makes an impression. Teaching is a vast field of relationships. Teacher pupil and teacher parent relation ships are the foundation of education. We all, those who are involved in all round development of a child, have to be inspirers and motivators to mould, shape and guide them to become good citizens, thereby making this world a better place to live in.

A child is young only once and only for a short time. An Educationist, Ham Ginet, says that while parents possess the original key to children's experience the spare one is held by teachers. Hence let us join hands and march with full vitality, zeal and enthusiasm and complement, strengthen and encourage each other's endeavours to make children good productive citizens and make education more meaningful and enjoyable.

Children are very precious as they are God's gift to us. They have to be moulded, shaped and guided with moral, ethical, and spiritual values, to build their character so that they are able to discriminate between right and wrong.

Education is the most significant instrument of individual self-realisation. Young Indians are driven by the aspiration that if they adequately educate and train themselves they have the potential of achieving anything in the world. Education is strongly connected with inspiration.
